Name that Musical

Time:	30 minutes
Objective:	Students will attempt to identify famous stage musicals from informa- tion about the music they are best-known for.
Materials Needed:	Pencils Paper Musical Information
Procedures:	 Divide the class into small groups. Explain that in this activity you (the teacher) will read some information about a famous stage musical. As a group, they will have two minutes to determine and write down the name of the musical you have described. At the end of the two minute discussion time, each group holds up a piece of paper with the name of a musical on it. If the name is correct, the group gets two points; if it is close, but not quite right, one point may be awarded. Play continues until all of the musicals have been described. Additional information about the musical such as the story line, may be provided by the teacher, to help students identify it, as is appropriate. The group with the most points at the end wins.





This musical was first performed in New York, 1946. The music and lyrics were both written by Irving Berlin. Best-known songs include *There's No Business Like Show Business and Anything You Can Do I Can Do Better*. What is the title of this musical production? **(Annie Get Your Gun)**

This musical was first performed in London, 1978. The music was written by Andrew Lloyd-Webber, with lyrics by Tim Rice. Best-known songs include *Don't Cry For Me Argentina* and *Goodnight and Thank You*. What is the title of this musical production? **(Evita)**

This musical was first performed in New York, 1971. The music was written by Jim Jacobs, with lyrics by Warren Casey. Best-known songs include *Summer Nights, Greased Lightning,* and *Beauty School Drop-Out.* What is the title of this musical production? **(Grease)**

This musical was first performed in New York, 1950. The music and lyrics were both written by Frank Loesser. Best-known songs include *Luck Be A Lady, If I Were A Bell,* and *Sit Down You're Rocking The Boat*. What is the title of this musical production? **(Guys and Dolls)**

This musical was first performed in New York, 1957. The music was written by Leonard Bernstein with lyrics by Stephen Sondheim. Best-known songs include *Maria, Tonight, America,* and *I Feel Pretty*. What is the title of this musical production? **(West Side Story)**

This musical was first performed in New York, 1956. The music was written by Frederick Loewe with lyrics by Alan Jay Lerner. Best-known songs include *The Rain in Spain, On The Street Where You Live,* and *I Could Have Danced All Night*. What is the title of this musical production? **(My Fair Lady)**

This musical was first performed in New York, 1959. The music was written by Richard Rodgers with lyrics by Oscar Hammerstein. Best-known songs include *My Favorite Things, Climb Every Mountain*, and *Do-Re-Mi*. What is the title of this musical production? **(The Sound of Music)**

This musical opened in London in 1986 and has now been seen in more than 119 cities in 24 countries and played to over 80 million people. Based on a novel by a Frenchman, the music was composed by Andrew Lloyd Webber with lyrics by Charles Hart and Richard Stilgoe. Best-known songs include *The Music and the Night, Masquerade*, and the song with the same title as the musical production. What is it? **(The Phantom of the Opera)**
