Teaching Strategies

We wouldn't expect substitute teachers to lecture to students on a topic they don't understand, hence the teaching strategies compiled in this lesson. While these are not the only teaching strategies available for substitute teachers, we have assembled and highlighted strategies that don't require prior knowledge on the part of the substitute teacher. You are also encouraged to find other teaching strategies that you would like to implement.

Following are examples of lesson plans that might be left for you. Based on the strategies taught in this lesson, what can you do to enhance the learning for each of these lesson plans?
